This summer will see events celebrating the life of Adelina Patti, the renowned opera singer who made her home in Breconshire until her death in 1919. There will be many events taking place which will be advertised locally and in the local press.

As background to these celebrations we are republishing an article written by Hilary Williams, in 2013. [Newsletter 21]

## Adelina Patti: a Breconshire resident 1878 - 1919

It is 176 years since the birth of Adela Juana Maria Patti in February 1843 to her operatic parents, Salvatore from Sicily and Caterina from Rome. Known as Adelina she was born in Spain while they were on tour. I will not rehearse her life story here, since there are very good books and websites available for that purpose. It is important, however, to highlight her legacy as a resident of Breconshire for the last 40 years of her life and

to record that of all the places where she toured and lived, her heart was in Craigy-nos (Rock of the Night).

Adelina was particularly drawn to the people of this area and her work for local charities was recognised officially, when in May 1897, she was made the first female Honorary Burgess of Brecon town. Her portrait hangs in the Council Chamber of the Guildhall in Brecon and at the National Portrait Gallery in London. At a lavish ceremony, usually reserved for royal visitors, she was also presented with a casket made of oak from an old beam taken from St John's Priory Church. Inside the casket was the scroll which entitled her to the Freedom of Brecon. She later stated "Amongst the gifts I am proudest of is the splendid casket containing the freedom of the city (sic) of Brecon. I love Wales and I love the Welsh people and this is the tangible reminder that this love I have borne them for so many years is returned."

Patti gave annual charity concerts for the poor of Brecon, Ystradgynlais, Ystalyfera, and other places. Her generosity made

her loved and admired, and she would regularly send to an ailing resident of the Craig-y-Nos area a basket of fruit picked from her own fruit trees, many of which were exotic and grown in her Winter Garden.

Anecdotes of her generosity were recounted by the older members of the vicinity for decades following her death. The religious ceremony of her second marriage (to Ernest Nicolini) was performed at St Cynog's Church, Ystradgynlais in 1886, and of her third marriage (to Baron Rolf Cederstrom) at St Michael's Roman Catholic Church, Brecon in 1899. The lavishness of her marriage to Nicolini is interesting, not only for the official guests but also for the local population. The residents of the villages in the Upper Tawe Valley decorated their villages with banners and garlands. In turn, Patti provided refreshments for 3,000 local children, and new clothes for the 300 poorest of them. Thousands of locals turned out to line the route between Craig-y-nos and the church at Ystradgynlais, seven miles away. The school children who sang at the wedding were rewarded with refreshments after the ceremony. That evening, "tons of fresh meat, wagonloads of white bread and pastry and huge casks of strong beer" were made available for the neighbours around Craig-y-nos. That night, there were fireworks and the firing of cannons in the grounds of the castle, whilst on a nearby mountain top, a huge bonfire, visible for miles, was lit to mark the occasion.

Her decision to marry Cederstrom in Brecon led to the Borough of Brecon declaring a municipal holiday. The Brecon County Times on 27th January 1899 expressed the satisfaction of the inhabitants of Brecon with these plans, "not only for the incomparable songstress that she is, but for the many kindnesses she has showered upon us." Brecon was "stirred to its foundations" with shields, banners, flags, arches, streamers and bunting decorating the town and thousands lined the route from Brecon station to the church in Wheat Street. The wedding party and the guests

had arrived by special train and Patti would have had her own Pullman carriage. After a short ceremony, the wedding party departed in similar fashion. Patti's relationship with her neighbours is demonstrated in a number of anecdotes. Encountering a tramp on the road near Craig-y-nos, Patti told him to go to the door of the castle kitchens to be fed.

Christmas for the children of the locality was a special time during Patti's residency there. It was one time in the year when she insisted on being in residence at Craig-y-nos, "or the children would think that evil days had fallen upon them." She provided refreshments for hundreds of children in the area. In a letter to her nephew, Alfredo Barili, in 1892, she wrote that she had provided tea for over 3,000 children and "Yesterday I gave my annual distribution of money to all the poor old people of the district – it was a most touching sight and everyone, myself included, cried." Christmas for the staff at Craig-y-nos was also pleasant. Patti would join the servants in their hall to share champagne and sing Christmas songs. In her theatre on Christmas evening, there would be a staff dance, at which Patti would dance with the chef, butler and footman whilst her husband danced with the senior domestic females. Everyone would be given Christmas gifts; according to Ethel Rosate-Lunn "cheques and jewellery for the house steward and the personal maids, costume lengths for the head maids and... the under maids."

By 1909 the lavish lifestyle which she had enjoyed with Nicolini was long gone. At its height, Craig-y-nos employed seventy indoor and outdoor staff, but by the time Ethel Rosate-Lunn joined the staff as laundry maid, in 1909, she said that there were 18 indoor members – "the house steward and his wife, Madame

Patti's two personal maids, three housemaids, three laundry maids, chef, three kitchen maids, butler/valet, two foot-men, and an odd job man."

During WWI, of course, the male servants had to go to war and a skeleton staff provided the labour needed to grow the vegetables, tend the fruit trees, and look after the grounds and the Winter Garden (now the Patti Pavilion in Swansea). When a member of her staff retired, he or she would receive a pension and those with no alternative accommodation were given a room at the castle for the rest of their days. On her death, her servants were generously rewarded: those who had worked for her for two years prior to her death received one year's wages, while more senior and long service staff were left specific amounts of money. There is much more to read about Adelina Patti and her wonderfully furnished home at Craig-y-nos. She was certainly a diva but I think that at Craig-y-nos, her "Home Sweet Home", she was able to achieve the home life she had always craved and although she was childless, her love of children and her genuine care for others was shown in the life she led at Craig-y-nos. She died on September 27<sup>th</sup> 1919 and was buried near her father in Pere Lachaise cemetery, Paris. After her death a camellia was named in her honour and blooms at Craig y Nos Park.

### The Sarah Siddons, 47, High Street, Brecon

Originally named The Shoulder of Mutton, this public house became famous because it was the birth place of Sarah Siddons nee Kemble, who became a famous actress.



In the 18<sup>th</sup> century, Brecon was on the theatre circuit of the Midlands and Wales, with actors performing in such places as the Great Room over the Bell Inn, High Street Superior. Sarah's father, Roger Kemble, was in charge of a Company of very good actors, who were regular visitors to Brecon. Sarah Kemble was born in the Shoulder of Mutton Inn, 2nd July 1755 to Roger and Sarah Kemble. Her mother went into labour and gave birth to Sarah in the Upper room. She was christened in St Mary's Church on the 14th July 1755. The register reads "Baptism of Sarah, daughter of George (sic) Kemble, Comedian and Sarah, his wife." Note the mistake in the father's name which should read Roger. Sarah married William Siddons, who was also in the Company and they settled in Bath, where she became one of the best actresses of her time. She became especially one of the best actresses of her time. She became especially famous for her portrayal of Lady Macbeth. Sarah died in 1831.

### The Bridges of Brecon: the Usk and Honddu River Bridges

Brecon's geographical position is reflected in the Welsh name for Brecon, which is Aberhonddu – the mouth or confluence of the Honddu river with the River Usk.



The main bridge into Brecon spans the river Usk. It was originally built in medieval times. That bridge was washed away by flooding in 1535. A new bridge was built in 1563 during the life of Elizabeth I [1533-1603]. In 1772 this second bridge was repaired and in 1794 it was widened. Its stone parapets were visible until the modernisation of the bridge in the 1970s, hid much of the original structure.

The Watergate or Honddu Bridge spans a much narrower and more turbulent river. This river provided water for a number of Mills on its banks. The iron Honddu Bridge over the river was built in 1874 to replace a stone bridge which had been badly damaged in a serious flood the year before. The present bridge has regularly had to be repaired and strengthened due to the power of the flooded river Honddu. The river's name is unusual and early recorded spellings include Hothenei and Hodni.

#### A couple of "stray" Wills from Hay. Ann rock, Hay, Brecs. Proved 18 Dec. 1817 Ref: PROB 11/1599

This is the last Will and Testament of me **Anne Rock** of the town of Hay in the County of Brecon widow. First my will and desire is that all my just debts and funeral expences be paid by my executors hereinafter named as well as all necessary and proper costs and charges attending the due execution of their office as such my executors and after payment thereof I give and bequeath to **Jane Stubbs** and **Sarah Scotl?** both of London

daughters of my late husband's brother **James Rock** the sum of one hundred pounds each. Also I give and bequeath to **Mary Churchey** of the town of Brecon widow of **Walter Churchey** late of the same place gentleman the sum of fifty pounds. Also I give and bequeath to my cousin **John Jones** of Cwmb? in the said County of Brecon the sum of fifty pounds. Also I give and bequeath the like sum of fifty pounds to the Widow **Blackburn** now of London widow of **Thomas Blackburn** nephew of my said late husband. Also I give and bequeath to **Eleanor Morgan** daughter of **Thomas Morgan** of Portway in the County of Hereford the sum of twenty pounds. Also I give and bequeath to **Diana Watkins** daughter of **George Watkins** of the said town of Hay the sum of twenty pounds. Also I give and bequeath the sum to **Elizabeth Hope?** wife of **John Hope?** of the said town of Hay sawyer? (lawyer?) and to **Edward Allen** of the same place Attorney at Law the sum of fifty pounds. I also give and bequeath unto **Walter Churchey** of the said town of Brecon gentleman and **Thomas Howells** of the town of Hay aforesaid the sum of five pounds each the whole of the above legacies to be paid at the expiration of twelve calendar months next after my decease. Also I give devise and bequeath to **Thomas Morgan** of Hay aforesaid brother of the above named **Elinor Morgan** all that my leasehold cottage garden land buildings and appurts which I hold as executrix of my said late husband under the Honorable **Noath? Harlan?** widow? situate at a place called C...toyddwr in the said parish of Hay to hold to him his executors and admors for and during all the remainder of my term therein subject to the payment of the annual sum of three guineas to **Hester Watkins** wife of the above named **George Watkins** during her life. And I do hereby charge my said leasehold property to and with the payment thereof half yearly as the same shall become due the first payment thereof to be made at the expiration of six months next after my decease. I further will that all my wearing apparel bed linen of every description be given to **Elizabeth Churchey** the daughter of the said **Walter Churchey** and that all my household goods be sold and after paying the expence of selling the net proceeds to be equally divided between the three daughters of the before named **Walter Churchey Elizabeth, ...?** and **Mary** and **Diana Watkins** the daughter of **George Watkins** aforesaid. And lastly I do hereby nominate constitute and appoint the said **Walter Churchey** and **John Jones** to be joint executors of this my last Will hereby revoking all former Wills and Codicils by me any time made and my will is that they my said executors may and shall have full power to grant release assign and transfer all messuages lands tenements and hereditaments whereof I am or shall at the time of my decease be seized as mortgagee in fee unto the person or persons legally entitled to the freehold and inheritance thereof or as he she or they shall direct or appoint.

In witness whereof I have hereunto set my hand and seal the twelfth day of May in the year ~~of our Lord~~ one thousand eight hundred and fifteen. The mark of **Anne Rock**.

Signed sealed published and declared by the said testatrix **Anne Rock** as and for her last Will and Testament in the Presence of us who in her presence and in the presence of each other have subscribed our names as witnesses. **Step<sup>n</sup> Merrick; Mary Merrick; Jno Price**, Brecon, Hay

In the name of God Amen I **Thomas Rock** of the town of Hay in the County of Brecon sadler being well in health and sound mind memory and understanding do make this my last Will and Testament in manner following. That is to say. I give and devise all those my several messuages tenements or dwelling houses with their respective gardens heredit and appurts situate standing and being in the village of Clirow in the County of Radnor commonly called or known by the name of Merddir or by whatsoever name or names the same

premises were or are called or known and which I purchased of **James Jones** of Bristol unto my dear wife **Anne Rock** on account of the property I had with her and of her great and long fidelity and care towards me and my ... and of the affection I bear towards her to hold the said freehold premises unto my said wife **Anne Rock** and her heirs for ever. And I also give devise and bequeath unto my said wife her heirs executors admors and assigns for ever all and singular other my freehold as well leasehold messuages or tenements with their

respective appurts and all and singular other my goods and chattles estates and effects of every kind hereby willing and desiring that all my funeral and admon expences and just debts shall be first paid out of my personal estate as far as it shall extend and if by that mean any of my debts should be paid or remain which is not likely to be the case I charge my freehold estate and property with the payment of the remainder. And lastly I do hereby nominate and appoint my said wife sole executrix of this my last Will and Testament.

In witness whereof I have hereunto set my hand and seal the fourth day of February in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and one. **Thomas Rock**



## Brecknockshire County Rifle Competition. Llangorse Rifle Range. 7<sup>th</sup> & 8<sup>th</sup> August 1866

We received an interesting email from a member of the Glasnevin Genealogy Society which is part of the Genealogical Society of Ireland.

Whilst browsing in Kilkenny, Gerard White and his wife visited a fruit and veg shop which had previously housed an antique bookshop. The new owner was selling off some books he had found, left behind by the previous owner he presumed. On returning home and examining his purchase Gerard came across a notice concerning a rifle competition to be held at the rifle range in Llangorse in 1866. Rather than let the notice be lost to history he contacted us and attached a copy to his email. So, 153 years later we have the opportunity to do a little research into who these people might have been. I hope to update members in our next newsletter.



### Can anyone help me break down a brick wall concerning my Great Great Grandmother?

My great great grandmother was Ann Price born around 1806. She married Roger Prosser at Merthyr Cynog Church in 1832. Roger and Ann baptised their first son, John, at Ebenezer Chapel in 1834. They were recorded as living at Waungoy/Werngou, Upper Honddu.

In 1802 another child was recorded as living at Waungoy/Werngou and was baptised at Ebenezer to Thomas and Ann Price nee Jones. The child was called Rees. Could this child be a brother to Ann and if so make Thomas and Ann her parents? I have drawn a blank in seeking this particular ancestry line as I cannot trace a baptism for Ann, probably because they were non-conformist and the records are sketchy. Ann and Thomas are buried at Ebenezer.

Ann's mother, Ann Thomas nee Jones is still alive in 1841 and living at a property called Cwmfotty with one Margaret Powell nee Price, who could be her daughter (and potentially a sibling of my Ann Price). Margaret is noted as being born in Merthyr Cynog in 1789 – an older sister to Ann? Price and Jones are very difficult names to trace and without any baptisms or birthplace information I am a bit stuck. Are any relations of Ann Jones/Ann Price still living around Merthyr Cynog/Upper Chapel? My Prosser line has been easier to follow but I am stumped on Ann's line.
